1. PARLIAMENT PERFORMANCE REPORT

1.1 BACKGROUND INFORMATION

The National Curriculum Centre was established in 1983 as a result of a merger between the Primary Curriculum Unit based in Manzini and the Secondary Curriculum unit which was based at Matsapha. The main purpose of its establishment was to "evaluate, design, prepare and co-ordinate the curricula for educational institutions ... (Ed Act 1981 pg S11).

1.1.1 VISION

The National Curriculum Centre aspires to be a leading research and curriculum development institution while turning into reality the nation's educational goals and aspirations.

1.1.2 MISSION STATEMENT

Our mission is to continuously improve our service delivery as we work together with all stakeholders in producing relevant, high quality, accessible and affordable curriculum materials and in serving as a resource in curriculum matters while striving to ensure the success of every learner and educator.

1.1.3 OBJECTIVES / TARGETS

To design, prepare, coordinate and evaluate the curricula for educational institutions

b) Short Term Objectives

- To design and develop a curriculum that adequately reflects the national development goals of Swaziland
- To design, produce and procure relevant and high quality instructional materials in line with the national education goals
- To train and provide support to stakeholders on new curricular and instructional materials
- To coordinate all curriculum development activities

1.2 ACHIEVEMENTS AND CHALLENGES

a) Achievements

Consultations with stakeholders on curriculum development

- Successfully **hosting the 1st Conference on Curriculum** where the theme was "Free Education: Realities and Curriculum implications" in October 2010. Participants got an opportunity to share their views with the Ministry of Education and Training on various issues related to the theme.
- Feedback meetings with teachers from pilot schools as well as Review Committees of various subjects were conducted this quarter. Feedback was effected in the materials and manuscript drafts
- The NCC also joined and **reported on their activities to other stakeholders** in the sector through activities like the National Education Policy Review workshop and various Subject Panels' meetings
- In ensuring wide participation in curriculum development, the National Curriculum Centre invited different stakeholders to Subject
 Revision workshops for Social Studies, Religious Studies and Orientation workshops for teachers and administrators in Physical Education
 and Sports.
- Participated in the development of UNISWA IDE instructional materials

Review and diversify (100%) curricula programmes

- Drafted curriculum guidelines on Disaster Relief issues in collaboration with the Disaster Relief Unit. These will later be developed for promotional programmes.
- Developed a proposal for the addition of **Arts and Culture as a Secondary school subject by 2015**. This is currently being discussed by stakeholders.
- Currently developing a Monolingual SiSwati Dictionary. This activity has secured funding from the Centre for Advanced Studies of African Society (CASAS)

Technical expertise on curriculum development offered to local institutions/organisations yearly

- Offered leadership to organisations on curriculum related issues e.g
 - > the development of a National Sports Education and Accreditation System for Swaziland National Sports Council;
 - > participating with AMADI University on programme implementation and assessment;
 - > The hosting of the Arts and Culture Council symposium
 - > The development of a curriculum guidelines for Disaster materials with the Disaster Management department
 - > The development of a curriculum for Non-Communicable Diseases for the Ministry of Health

- > The development of a Framework and Trainers' manual for the Schools as Centres of Care and Support.
- > The development of TVET Occupational Frameworks

Evaluate instructional materials

- Evaluation instruments for instructional materials were developed for Religious Education, Primary English, Physical Education and Sports and used for the review activities
- Achievement tests for Practical Arts and Physical education and Sports were developed and administered

b) Challenges

- Transport was the main challenge such that officers had to be either transported in small groups or sometimes have few officers attending a training session or workshop. NCC officers are almost always late for meetings. Also the NCC budget for CTA Charges is fast declining since huge amounts are spent on very old problematic vehicles that spend every second week at the repairs.
- Having some of the curriculum development activities coordinated away from the National curriculum Centre is a huge drawback on our
 activities e.g. syllabus development is coordinated by subject panels in this country. Some of them do not meet for as long as 5 years. This
 implies therefore that no materials may be reviewed for all that time. Such examples are primary SiSwati, and Agriculture
- The incomplete activity of reviewing the **National Education Policy** is delaying the development of a Curriculum Development policy/guideline which is desperately urgent.
- The inability of the MOET to hold **Professional Staff Meetings** for over a year has hindered the opportunity for NCC to share her research findings with her major stakeholders.
- The inability to create new posts for curriculum designers in certain areas has caused curriculum development to lag behind related interventions in those areas, e.g. in
 - Special education
 - ICT
 - ECCD
